



Family's touching story highlights history, compassion of hospice care

ANNIVERSARY

This is the story of Michelle (Dowie) Friedly, a Cedar Valley Hospice patient, as told by her caregiver and mother. Pam Dowie.

* * *

Our story began on an ordinary winter day in January 2001. I was babysitting

my new grandson, Tate, while my daughter (his mother Michelle) headed off to her doctor's appointment. He was 5 months old, and nursing was not going well. Michelle had been treated for an infected milk duct gland that was getting worse.

From that doctor's appointment on, there were no more ordinary days. Michelle was immediately sent to a surgeon and her breast was biopsied. We waited on pins and needles, and then, the dreaded diagnosis came. She had stage 4 metastatic breast cancer, and her prognosis was one year. She was 29 years old.

For over three years, she courageously battled the disease, receiving treatment. Eventually, the cancer spread to her brain. I remember Sept. 11 for a different reason than most people. Michelle had her first brain surgery that day. When Michelle developed bone cancer, we knew it was time to call Cedar Valley Hospice. It was her time to take control, and she did. Looking back, it could have been a sad time, but it wasn't. Our days were no longer filled with endless doctor appointments, tests and chemotherapy sessions. Instead, they became moments of love and connection.

Michelle cherished and adored her hospice caregivers and eagerly anticipated their visits. The staff quickly became part of our family. At first, I felt a bit of jealousy, realizing I wasn't needed in the same way. But as hospice took over her medical care, I found that my role was transformed in a beautiful way. I was able to simply be her mother, grandmother to her boys, her friend and her support – exactly what she needed me to be. I was there for the moments that truly mattered.

Her aide really loved Michelle and provided her companionship and almost anything Michelle wanted – from manicures and foot rubs to plenty of Diet Coke or her favorite foods. To see her cared for in that loving way by a total stranger meant so much to all of us who loved Michelle.

During her battle, she was taken to the Cedar Valley Hospice Home to manage her pain and symptoms. We appreciated the comforts provided to us and especially Michelle's two sons. The home was a calm and peaceful place; we all had our space and place to share in the journey with her. As the cancer progressed, breathing became extremely difficult. One episode led to an emergency room visit, and Michelle was severely agitated. She kept requesting to go "home" as she didn't like the cold, sterile hospital room. When we expressed that wasn't possible due to her care needs, she gently corrected us saying, "Not home... the Hospice Home."

We had all been with her from the start, so it was natural that we would all be with her at the end. For two days, people were everywhere – on couches, chairs and sleeping on the floor. The staff was so sweet and talked to us, cried with us, and explained what was going on. Even though it was awful, it felt peaceful and right. We embraced each other and supported one another. Having everyone there gave us the strength to see her through the last days.



Pam opened a butterfly box at Release & Remember. Before the release, she wiped away tears as Michelle's story was told as part of the day's program. Then she was able to celebrate her life as she helped the butterflies take flight. "It was just wonderful," she said.

I can't imagine having gone through this experience without Cedar Valley Hospice. They took away some of the fear and anxiety, comforting us through the unknown. They truly understand the dying and grieving process and turn it into a beautiful memory.

Moments that Matter

With Michael Deters, Hospice Physician and former Medical Director, started Sept. 1, 2008 Retired end of September 2024.

Describe your position with Cedar Valley Hospice.

I am a team physician for Cedar Valley Hospice. I am available to fill positions when the other team physicians are absent or ill and help with the teams, on-call and at the Hospice Home – where I work one weekend a month.

I started at Cedar Valley Hospice 16 years ago as the first staff medical director because it was required by Medicare to have one on staff versus volunteer team physicians. It was part-time initially, but turned into full-time. At that time, we had no computerized charting and everything was on paper, including paper charts. I was initially on call 24/7 for any problems that needed help solving from a physician's standpoint.

How does your position support our mission?

I have had two goals in mind as I worked for Cedar Valley Hospice. I always wanted to help provide the best care possible to patients, caregivers and families. As part of the team, I wanted to provide the best knowledge I could to help them handle death and dying in a dignified way. We want to demonstrate how much we care for them and would do all that was necessary to give them the best days that they had left.

What are the most enjoyable aspects of your job?

Share a story that has impacted you.

Every family with whom I work with leaves an impact on me, but I do remember one patient specifically. She had a deep faith and was so well adjusted to her terminal illness, which is uncommon. She had so much concern for her loved ones over herself. She told me, 'I am the lucky one, I am not the one left behind.' It was very inspiring.

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For our Patriotic Nights event in 2016, Dr. Deters showed in up as Uncle Sam with his wingman, his son-in-law, who dressed up as a bald eagle.

There are so many rewards in this position. I love working with patients and families to help them during such a difficult time. In turn, we also learn so much about life and values from them. I also enjoy being a part of the team of specialists who all share a common goal to serve the patient and family. I am no more important than any other member of my team.

What makes Cedar Valley Hospice stand out above other hospice providers in the area?

Cedar Valley Hospice stands out as the premier organization in their league. I can say this honestly since I referred patients to them when I was in practice. I have also experienced firsthand the compassionate care Cedar Valley Hospice provides. I was a patient many years ago, but was able to recover. The entire team demonstrates concern while delivering the best quality of care. In my career, I've been blessed to have worked with so many great coworkers as well as families.

Family Ties

Seiberts give back for care they received

The Seibert Family, including Dr. Cecil Seibert, Beth Seibert and Bill and Marty Seibert, have all been served by Cedar Valley Hospice. Bill and Marty are also an important part of Cedar Valley Hospice history, having

volunteered for over a decade.

In 2001, the couple served as honorary chairpersons of Cedar Valley Hospice's annual campaign and wrote a letter to donors urging them to help support the organization that "helped them through the most difficult part of their lives" with the loss of their daughter, Beth, at age 28. Their son, Steve, recently wrote about how each death affected them and how Cedar Valley Hospice was there to help make a positive difference in their whole family's lives. He said:

For 40 years, the Cedar Valley Hospice angels have been there for us in our time of need. My first memory was in 1984 when my grandfather, Dr. Cecil Seibert, was suffering from leukemia and our parish priest suggested Cedar Valley Hospice come to help. My father, Bill, struggled with the idea, but as soon as the hospice volunteers arrived, my father was instantly at peace, as was Cecil. After grandpa's death, my father began volunteering in various capacities for Cedar Valley Hospice. He was instrumental in fundraising for the Hospice Home. I knew that their mission was extremely near to my father's heart, and he continued to volunteer, not knowing how they would help us again many times in the future.

"In the spring of 2000, my sister Beth was also diagnosed with leukemia, and it rocked our family. Beth fought harder than any human I knew, but the disease became too much.

At the end, she went to the Hospice Home, and as soon as the loving nurses put her in the room, I realized why my dad was so passionate about it getting built.

"My father and hero, Bill Seibert, became ill in the summer of 2010. When we walked into his room at the Hospice Home, he looked like he was completely restored to health by the Cedar Valley Hospice nurses! He was washed, fed a chocolate milkshake (his favorite!) and was resting comfortably under a beautiful quilt handmade by a volunteer.

"Mom [Marty] fell ill in the summer of 2023 and fought as long as she could. It was such beautiful moment to see mom's reaction when I told her that she was in the same room that Beth was when she passed at the Hospice Home ... an incredible sense of peace enveloped her."
